## Georgia Senate Races - Can You Help?




## November 2020 Election Results

This year's election brought good and bad news. Let's get the bad news out of the way first. Our Randolph County Democratic candidates were unable to withstand unprecedented Republican turnout in what was going to be a tough election even without a red wave and dealing with a pandemic. Republicans outperformed Democrats at the federal, state, and local level in every race in Randolph County.

Now for the good news. Democrats outperformed their registration numbers. Our county-wide candidates each had over 15,700 votes despite a turnout of only a little over 12,300 Democratic voters in this election. This means we were able to sway at least 3000 voters who were either unaffiliated or registered with other parties. In Asheboro East, District Judge Brooke Schmidly came out well over 300 votes ahead of her GOP challenger with over 3000 votes cast in the precinct where only 1113 registered Democrats voted. It was the only precinct win for a Democratic candidate in Randolph County. Our candidates for NC House and Senate and County Commissioner were only off by about 200 votes from their Republican opponents there as well. We need to spread our successes in Asheboro East to other precincts.

As COVID-19 is peaking a second time in Randolph County and North Carolina, our party knows we did everything we could to protect our community. We followed the protocols and guidance from the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services. We wore masks and enforced social distancing when campaigning. We opted to drop off campaign literature door-to-door rather than canvas face-to-face. We avoided holding large indoor campaign events, opting instead for online meetings. GOP candidates largely ignored the guidance. Sadly 87 people have now died due to the disease and 5,488 cases have been confirmed in our county since March.

Please stay safe as we navigate the winter months. Wear a mask, maintain social distancing, and stay home when possible. We will make it through this to better days.
