"Chowchilla" is a recently released CNN documentary about the kidnapping of 26 children and a school bus driver in Chowchilla, Cali., on July 15, 1976. There are no frills in this one, just interviews with students, parents, and law enforcement — back then and now. I had never heard of the incident (I was only 1 when it happened). Not only was the documentary well done, but you can see how these events were the cornerstone of how we deal with school tragedies today.

Let's Get Organized to Elect Democrats

Ah, February! Love is in the air. Valentine's candy has been in the stores since at least Christmas. February is Black History Month and Mardi Gras is starting soon. There's so much good stuff to celebrate this month, but the thing that makes Democratic organizers' hearts flutter is Precinct Organization. Let me tell you, these past few years there have been more heart palpitations than flutters. We have got a lot of work to do.

There are 15,019 registered Democrats in Randolph County. We need 5 people in each of our 22 precincts. That's 110 of you, less than 1% of the registered Dems in our county. We need you to come together, elect officers, and get our voting precincts organized. What do precinct officers and volunteers do? These people help us increase voter turnout by talking to neighbors, helping place campaign signs with people who request them, or working at their polling place distributing campaign literature. An orderly voting precinct is grassroots level organizing; neighbors helping neighbors exercise their basic rights as American citizens.

Of our 22 voting precincts in Randolph County, 11 are at least partially organized or have someone who is interested in getting it organized. Only 3 of those have a full set of officers and volunteers. This is just unacceptable. There are hundreds

of registered Dems in every single precinct, even the ones way out yonder. Are you telling me that there aren't 5 people in Trinity or Southwest precincts who care about getting Dems elected up and down the ballot? I refuse to believe that.

Being an organizer in your precinct will not require much of your time. We promise not to overload you with duties. We're only asking for maybe a couple of hours a month to help get as many Democrats as possible elected in North Carolina.

This year's election is crucial. We've all seen the hard-right, white nationalist, anti-woman, anti-immigrant, anti-American candidates the GOP has recruited at all levels. Your Democratic Party needs you to pitch in and help.

The first step is attending your precinct organization meeting on Saturday, February 17, at 9:30 am at the George Washington Carver Center, 950 MLK Jr. Dr., Asheboro. This will be one large cluster meeting for all precincts, and we will be having breakfast while we organize! Please come. Bring your Randolph County Democratic friends and bring a breakfast item to share.



Today (January 22, 2024) we mark the 51st anniversary of Roe v. Wade, a historic decision affirming women's fundamental right to privacy and personal health care choices. Biden Visits North Carolina

President Joe Biden announced an \$82 million investment to expand "affordable, high-speed internet" to 16,000 homes and businesses across North Carolina on Thursday, January 18, in Raleigh.

Biden likened the administration's work on expanding broadband access to President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's determination to spread electricity across the United States during the Great Depression. "I made the same determination about affordable, high-speed internet," declared Biden. "It's just as essential today as electricity was a century ago."

Biden painted an image of kids and their parents sitting in the parking lot of McDonald's, attempting to access the restaurant's internet to complete their homework during the pandemic. He also noted that the continued expansion of high-speed internet would assist seniors in accessing telemedicine, enable people of faith to attend church services from home, and empower small businesses to reach customers globally.

Gov. Roy Cooper kicked off the event. He proclaimed that part of his vision was to create a North Carolina that would be "more educated" with "more job training" by the end of his tenure. He emphasized the expansion of internet access as a crucial strategy to achieve that goal: "North Carolina has become a leader in the quest to connect every single family and every single business to the internet."

Echoing Cooper, Biden stated that the administration's goal is to ensure that every North Carolinian has "access to high-speed and affordable internet" by the end of the decade.



Reminder of Biden's Oath of Office

Three years ago today, President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris took the oath of office, vowing to restore faith in our democratic institutions.

"This is a time of testing," Biden said in his inaugural address. "We face an attack on democracy and on truth. A raging virus. Growing inequity. The sting of systemic racism. A climate in crisis. America's role in the world. Any one of these would be enough to challenge us in profound ways. But the fact is we face them all at once, presenting this nation with the gravest of responsibilities.

"Now we must step up. All of us. It is a time for boldness, for there is so much to do. And, this is certain. We will be judged, you and I, for how we resolve the cascading crises of our era. Will we rise to the occasion? Will we master this rare and difficult hour? Will we meet our obligations and pass along a new and better world for our children?"
